**FAITH HAVE NO BEARING ON INDIVIDUAL'S FREEDOM**

The Delhi High Court has recently held that the freedom of choice in marriage is in accordance with law is an intrinsic part of Article 21 protection of life and personal liberty of the Constitution. In view of the above, the High Court said that the police should not expeditiously in cases of couples legally marrying out of their own free will and volition.

A bench of Justice Anoop Kumar Mendiratta noted, "Even questions of faith have no bearing on an individual's freedom to choose a life partner and are essence of personal liberty."

It was hearing a case of an alleged attempt to murder of a man by the relatives of a woman who married him against their wishes. The kin, including her mother and grandmother, allegedly beat him up, cut off his private parts with an axe and also stabbed him.

Considering the grave nature of the offence and the 'ghastly manner in which the assault', the HC refused to grant bail to the wife's mother and grandmother who allegedly participated in the assault. The court said it was 'unfortunate' that necessary steps for ensuring the safety and security of the couple were not initiated by the police station concerned on their complaint when they were expected to act with promptitude and any such lapse cannot be accepted and thus called for action against those responsible.

Wherever the life and liberty of any individual is concerned, especially in cases of couple legally marrying out of their own free will and volition, the police is expected to act expeditiously and with sensitivity in accordance with law and take necessary measures for protection and safety of applicants concerned, if they apprehend hostility and concerns for their safety from different quarters including their own family members," the court said.
